







In 2018, **57.8M** Americans had a mental and/or substance use

PAST YEAR, 2008-2018 NSDUH, 18+







Reasons for Not Receiving Mental Health Services in the Past Year








Suicide rate estimates, age-standardized estimates by country, per 100,000 population, 2010 to 2016

State Mental Health Agencies

In the U.S., State governments have had the lead responsibility for organizing, funding, and delivering mental health services to Adults with Serious Mental Illness (SMI) and Children with Serious Emotional Disturbances (SED)


- The first state psychiatric hospital opened in Virginia in 1773. Every state operates psychiatric inpatient beds and funds or operates a community mental health system
- Every state organizes its public mental health system differently.



State Mental Health Agency Services

- In Fiscal Year 2015, SMHAs controlled the expenditures of over \$43 billion to provide mental health services to 7 million unique clients
 - Expenditures were \$135.80 per US resident
 - 2% of US population received an SMHA supported MH Service
 - 75% of spending was for community-based services
 - 22% of spending was in state psychiatric hospitals


Trends in SMHA-Controlled Mental health Spending (Current and Inflation Adjusted), FY 1981 to FY 2015





Per Capita SMHA Expenditures for Mental Health: FY 1981 to 2015,






Patients in State Psychiatric Hospitals As a Share of SMHA Systems: FY 2015









Total FY'2015 SMHA-Controlled Per Capita Mental Health Expenditures



Funding Sources for SMHA Services: FY1981 to FY2015




Organization of State Mental Health, Substance Abuse, and Intellectual Disability Service Reponsibilities: 2015




Primary Mechanism Used by SMHAs to Administer Community Mental Health Services: 2015






Number of State Psychiatric Hospitals, 2015





Number of State Psychiatric Hospitals & Resident Patients at End of Year: 1950 - 2015






Number of Clients that Received SMHA Mental Health Services: 2018


- 58 states and territories reported data in 2018
- 7,808,416 clients (or 23.7 per 1,000) received services, including:
 - 5,669,155 adults (or 22.5 per 1,000)
 - 2,129,471 children (or 28.9 per 1,000)
 - 9,790 clients were missing age data
- 2.4% of the U.S. population received services from state mental health agencies
 - Ranging from 0.1% to 7.2% of state population

Percent of Clients Served, by Service Setting: 2018 URS data


- •97% of clients received community-based mental health services
 - \$22.9 per 1,000 population
- ❖1.7% of clients received services in state psychiatric hospitals
 - Range from less than 1% of clients (in 11 states) to 12% in (2 states) of total clients served
- ❖5.7% of clients received services in other psychiatric inpatient settings (39 states reporting on OPI)

Clients that Received SMHA Services per 1,000 State Population: 2018






Age and Gender Distribution of All Clients Served: 2018






Variation in Utilization Rate (per 1,000) of All Clients Served, by Age Group: 2018



Variation in Utilization Rate (per 1,000) of All Clients Served, by Race: 2018




Employment Status of Adult (Age 18 & Older) SMHA Clients: 2018

Percent of Adult (Age 18 & Older) SMHA Clients Employed: 2007 to 2018




State Mental Health Client Level Data

Starting in 2011, SMHAs began submission of de-identified client level data on all clients reported in their URS data system (reporting as part of MH Block Grant requirement—Data Due by December 1 each year):

- Client Level Data is de-identified client level information that contains additional about diagnoses, outcomes, and permits cross-tab analysis of client characteristics
- Reported by states as a companion to their URS reporting.
 - Not all states report.
 - 2018 data from 44 States, plus DC, Northern Marian Islands, Palau, and Puerto Rico.




Percent of Mental Health Clients Served, by Age and SMI/SED



Percent of Adults (Age 18 Years and Older) Served, by Diagnosis: 2018




Percent of Children (Age 0 to 17 Years) Served, by Diagnosis: 2018




Percent of Mental Health Clients Served, by Treatment Status at the Start and End of 2018 and SMI/SED Status





Percent of Mental Health Clients Discharged at the End of 2018, by Reason for Discharge and SMI/ SED Status






Employment: Profiles of Adult Clients







Percent of Clients Served, by Residential Status at Admission or Start of Reporting Year and at Discharge or End of Reporting Year: 2018





Percent of Homeless Clients Aged 18 Years and Older at Discharge or End of Reporting Year, by Diagnosis: 2018






First Episode Psychosis Programs

- Based on International research and a series of NIMH supported studies in the U.S. (Recovery After Initial Schizophrenia Episode, RAISE), states have been supporting Coordinated Specialty Care (CSC) programs focusing on clients with first episodes of psychosis (FEP)
- In FY 2014 Congress added \$30 million to the Mental Health Block Grant to States (a 5% set-aside) and in 2016 doubled that to 10% of the Mental Health Block Grant
- State Governments have contributed additional state general funds (state tax funds) to further expand First Episode Psychosis services




Cumulative Number of States with Early Psychosis Intervention Plans
